HOLY NAME MEN AT WORK. . . . in the basement of the Rectory



One of the more recent projects the Holy Name Society men took on was giving the kitchen area, in the rectory, a "make over." The work in progress began a few months ago and was a massive undertaking.

Some of the "helpers" involved, as seen in the photo, were the late Charles "Skip" Newcomer, Rick Morrison and Bernie Wolgemuth, Jr. Other men involved included HNS president Mark Grab, Joe Stehman, Terry Crumbling, Bern Wolgemuth, Sr., Josh and Brett Wolgemuth.

The project included the installation of new cabinets and replacing the stove and refrigerator. Ceiling tiles were replaced, and a new coat of paint covered the walls.

All new plumbing fixtures were added. New wiring and receptacles replaced old fixtures. A back splash around the new countertops was the culmination of the project and a new coffee maker was added.

PASTORAL COUNCIL

The Annual Holy Name Society Father-Son Communion-Breakfast was held on Sunday, February 12, 2017. Following the 8:00AM Mass, celebrated by our pastor **Father Stephen Kelley**, the fathers and their sons gathered in the Parish Center. They were treated to a delicious "family style" breakfast prepared by ladies of the Altar Rosary Society.

Andrew Yeager was introduced and inducted into the Society by Father Kelley who administered the Holy Name Pledge. President **Mark Grab** then announced the 2017 Man of the Year, **Mike Leibhart**, who was unable to attend. Later his award was presented by Father Kelley and Mark Grab in the parish office. Mike toils quietly almost on a daily basis around the parish making repairs, constructing shelving and building cabinets. He is a retired Industrial Arts Teacher, a master carpenter, an excellent wood worker, gunsmith and one who loves big game hunting in Africa. Mike and his wife Barbara volunteer making fastnachts as well. He is most deserving of this honor for the untold hours he unselfishly gives to the parish

A highlight of the morning was the wildlife presentation given by **Ben Grab.** He is a great ambassador for the North Museum in Lancaster. Ben shared a number of "critters" with his young audience that was held spellbound. He certainly could give Channel 8's Jack Hubley a run for his money. Ben's presentation was outstanding!

All men of our parish, 9th grade and older, are invited to be a part of our Holy Name Society. We urge you to join soon and help us support our church by volunteering in any of the following activities of the Holy Name Men:

The HNS meets the second Sunday of each month, following the 8:00AM Mass in the rectory basement. Come and join us at our next meeting.

Our present pipe organ was built in 1951 by the Mudler Hunter Organ Company of Philadelphia. Through the years it has been maintained and modified but is in need of a major restoration. Our organ is a three manual, 32 note pedal board which has 21 ranks of pipes with some 2000 speaking pipes.

This massive project of restoring our church organ got underway the week of June 26th with the arrival of workmen from the Peragallo Pipe Organ Company from Paterson, New Jersey. The company was founded in 1918 by John Peragallo, Sr. and is now in its fourth generation of family involvement. The Peragallo firm is a family organization whose instruments reflect both the foundation of a deep-rooted dedication to old world craftsmanship and a commitment to the functional technology of today's digital society.



All of the pipes, metal and wooden, wind chests, etc. have been removed from the pipe chambers on either side of the choir loft. These were then carefully packed in special crates for transport to workshop facilities in northern New Jersey. The intricate work includes cleaning, removing deteriorating leather, and applying new leather with proper adhesives. New heads and springs will be installed. This work is very tedious and must be precise.

The pipe chambers will be thoroughly cleaned and fluorescent lighting added. The four sets of façade pipes were removed and will be refinished in a bright gold lacquer. The restoration is expected to be completed in fifteen weeks.

When the work in Paterson is completed the elements of the organ will be brought back to Columbia and installed. The following will be added to enhance the tone pallet of the organ: an Oboe, a 2 foot Fifteenth, Unda Maris, a set of chimes, and a *Trumpet en Chamade* which will provide the organist with a most useful tool for processional and fanfare music.



During this period that the organ is offline the company provided a temporary loaner organ, a Roland Classic Series, Model C330. This enables us to have organ music for our weekend Masses and special services.

The Peragallo Company has refurbished and serves as curators for the organs at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City and the famous Wurlitzer at Radio City Music Hall. Closer to home they installed a new instrument in Grace UCC Church in Hanover, York County, and recently refurbished the organ at St. Anthony's Church in Lancaster.

This major restoration project represents a lifetime investment in quality music and worship for the Holy Trinity parish community.

ROOFING REPAIR.....

A major roofing repair on the church bell tower got underway July 10th. The McCreesh Slate Roofing, LLC of Red Lion, York County was hired to correct a deteriorating situation. This firm works exclusively with slate, cooper and tile roofing.

The two-week project unearthed more damage than was originally thought. The damage developed over more than four decades. Rain water and melting snow seeped into the underside of the roof. Enormous amounts of wood that rotted had to be replaced. The old gutters removed.

According to Peter McCreesh, proprietor of the company, new custom box spouts, made of copper, were shaped and installed to redirect the water properly into down spouts. In this photo you see McCreesh, creating the custom spouts.



A huge lift, which can extend to 120 feet, was pressed into service to transport not only the workmen and tools but materials as well to the roof top.



A crew of seven men toiled under the blistering July sun with temperatures reaching, on most days, 90 plus degrees and high humidity. They worked in a very confined area and wore harnesses for safety purposes and floppy hats to protect them from the sun.

Before the skilled crews could reach the damaged area they had to remove two rows of slate shingles. This is a tedious project unto itself.

When work began each morning sidewalks had to be closed to pedestrian traffic and Cherry Street was reduced to a single lane for vehicles.

JUST THE FACTS, PLEASE.....



The 93rd Annual Fastnacht Bake was a great success on several fronts. We exceeded previous years' profits and had an unusual order request which we were able to fulfill.

Here are some of the facts. During the Lenten Season, we produced **6,813** dozen fastnachts resulting in a total of **81,756** individual morsels. Total money received amounted to **\$57,127**. Subtract our expenses, and we had a net profit of **\$48,968.06**. This represents an increase of **\$6,722** over the 2016 profit of \$42,246.

This represents a tremendous effort from the 160 volunteers, some seen in the photo to the left, and the hundreds of parishioners and members of the greater Columbia community who support and purchase our fastnachts. Praise the Lord and pass the fastnachts!

Even our pastor, Father Stephen Kelley, had a hand in helping this season. Here he is seen receiving instructions from "doughboy" Mark Grab. This was Father's first exposure to the production line of this major parish fund raiser. He apparently passed the test and has been invited back to help next season.

More facts from the Order Department: use of the Parish website exceeded all expectations. We had **2,884** dozen that were ordered on-line. Factory orders totaled **1,075** dozen. The workers purchased **1,985**



dozen, and the telephone hot-line dwindled to just **815** orders—a far cry from the early days when all orders were recorded by telephone. How times have changed!

The unusual order was placed by Danielle Drought, of Washington, D.C., grand-daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Bill Etter. Danielle ordered 8 ½ dozen which she shared at her June wedding reception representing "something old" from her past.

During the wrap-up meeting, early in May, **Jim Knapp** was elected as the next Chairperson of the Fastnacht Committee. **Matt Taylor**, the former chairperson, had to step aside due to increased responsibilities at his workplace which at times require him to travel abroad. His efforts for the past 3 years have been appreciated.

The 94th Annual Fastnacht Bake begins February 12, 2018.

Deacons Sahd and Lyons have been studying at Saint Charles Borromeo Seminary in Wynnewood, PA. Deacons Roth and Dunkelberger are studying at Mount Saint Mary's Seminary, Emmitsburg, MD.

PASTORAL MUSICIANS CONVENE IN CINCINNATI

The National Association of Pastoral Musicians 40th Annual Convention was held in Cincinnati, Ohio, July 10-14, 2017. The theme was **Formed as One** – *Union of Voices, Unity of Hearts*. Holy Trinity's Director of Music/Organist, Bernie Wickenheiser was in attendance. Providing education, formation, and support for pastoral musicians and clergy the convention is a forum for advocating musical excellence in liturgical celebrations.

The gathering began with the opening Mass on Monday with the vision of one of the first documents of the liturgical renewal, which affirmed: "Liturgical worship is given a more noble form when it is celebrated in song, with the ministers of each degree fulfilling their ministry and the people participating in it. Indeed, through this form, prayer is expressed in a more attractive way, the mystery of the liturgy, with its hierarchical and community nature, is more openly shown, the *unity of hearts* is more profoundly achieved by the *union of voices*, minds are more easily raised to heavenly things by the beauty of the sacred rites, and the whole celebration more clearly prefigures that heavenly liturgy which is enacted in the holy city of Jerusalem" (Musicam Sacram 1967), 5.
