Holy Saturday

Introduction

Public and common prayer by the people of God is rightly considered to be among the primary duties of the Church. From the very beginning, those who were baptized "devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the community, to the breaking of the bread, and to prayer" (Acts 2:42). The Acts of the Apostles give frequent testimony to the fact that the Christian community prayed with one accord.

The witness of the early Church teaches us that individual Christians devoted themselves to prayer at fixed times... Such prayer in common gradually took the form of a set cycle of hours. This liturgy of the hours or divine office, enriched by readings, is principally a prayer of praise and petition. Indeed, it is the prayer of the Church with Christ and to Christ.

Christ taught us: "You must pray at all times and not lose heart" (Lk 18:1). The Church has been faithful in obeying this instruction; it never ceases to offer prayer and makes this exhortation its own: "Through him (Jesus) let us offer to God an unceasing sacrifice of praise" (Heb 15:15). The Church fulfills this precept not only by celebrating the Eucharist but in other ways also, especially through the liturgy of the hours. By ancient Christian tradition what distinguishes the liturgy of the hours from other liturgical services is that it consecrates to God the whole cycle of the day and the night.

Antiphon 1:

Deacon: Though sinless, the Lord has been put to death. The world is in mourning as for an only son

Psalm 64

Prayer for help against enemies

This psalm commemorates most particularly our Lord's passion (St Augustine).

| Deacon: | Hear my voice, O God, as I complain, |
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| | guard my life from dread of the foe. |
| | Hide me from the band of the wicked, |
| | from the throng of those who do evil. |

- All: They sharpen their tongues like swords; they aim bitter words like arrows to shoot at the innocent from ambush, shooting suddenly and recklessly.
- Deacon: They scheme their evil course; they conspire to lay secret snares. They say: "Who will see us? Who can search out our crimes?"
- All: He will search who searches the mind and knows the depth of the heart. God has shot them with his arrow and dealt them sudden wounds. Their own tongue has brought them to ruin and all who see them mock.

| Deacon: | Then will all men fear; they will tell what God has done. They will understand God's deeds. The just will rejoice in the Lord and fly to him for refuge. All the upright hearts will glory. |
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| All: | Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: |
| Deacon: | as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen. |
| Psalm Prayer | |
| Priest: | Father, you gave your Son victory over the men who plotted evil against him; when he cried to you in his agony, you delivered him from fear of his enemies. May those who suffer with him in this life find refuge and success in you. |
| Antiphon 1 All: | Though sinless, the Lord has been put to death. The world is in mourning as for an only son. |
| Antiphon 2 | From the jaws of hell I ord rescue my soul |

Deacon: From the jaws of hell, Lord, rescue my soul.

Canticle: Isaiah 38:10-14, 17b-20 Anguish of a dying man and joy in his restoration *I was living, I was dead . . . and I hold the keys of death* (Revelation 1:17-18).

Deacon: Once I said, "In the noontime of life I must depart! To the gates of the nether world I shall be consigned for the rest of my years."

- All: I said, "I shall see the Lord no more in the land of the living. No longer shall I behold my fellow men among those who dwell in the world."
- Deacon: My dwelling, like a shepherd's tent, is struck down and borne away from me; you have folded up my life, like a weaver who severs the last thread.
- All: Day and night you give me over to torment; I cry out until the dawn. Like a lion he breaks all my bones; day and night you give me over to torment.
- Deacon: Like a swallow I utter shrill cries; I moan like a dove. My eyes grow weak, gazing heavenward: O Lord, I am in straits; be my surety!
- All: You have preserved my life from the pit of destruction, When you cast behind your back all my sins.
- Deacon: For it is not the nether world that gives you thanks, nor death that praises you; Neither do those who go down into the pit await your kindness.

| All: | The living, the living give you thanks, as I do today. Fathers declare to their sons, O God, your faithfulness. |
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| Deacon: | The Lord is our savior; we shall sing to stringed instruments In the house of the Lord all the days of our life. |
| All: | Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: |
| Deacon: | as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen. |
| Antiphon 2 All: | From the jaws of hell, Lord, rescue my soul. |

Antiphon 3

| Deacon: | I was dead, but now I live for ever, |
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| | and I hold the keys of death and of hell. |

Psalm 150

Praise the Lord

Let mind and heart be in your song: this is to glorify God with your whole self (Hesychius).

Deacon: Praise God in his holy place, praise him in his mighty heavens. Praise him for his powerful deeds, praise his surpassing greatness.

All: O praise him with sound of trumpet, praise him with lute and harp.

Praise him with timbrel and dance, praise him with strings and pipes.

Deacon: O praise him with resounding cymbals, praise him with clashing of cymbals. Let everything that lives and that breathes give praise to the Lord.

All: Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit:

Deacon: As it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen.

Psalm Prayer

Priest: Lord God, maker of heaven and earth and of all created things, you make your just ones holy and you justify sinners who confess your name. Hear us as we humbly pray to you: give us eternal joy with your saints.

Antiphon 3

All: I was dead, but now I live for ever, and I hold the keys of death and of hell.

READING

Hebrews 4:1-13 (taken from the Office of Readings) *Let us strive to enter the Lord's rest*

Lector: While the promise of entrance into his rest still holds, we ought to be fearful of disobeying lest any one of you be judged to have lost his chance of entering. We have indeed heard the good news, as they did. But the word which they heard did not profit them, for they did not receive it in faith.

It is we who have believed who enter into that rest, just as God said:

"Then I swore in my anger, "They shall never enter into my rest.""

Yet God's work was finished when he created the world, for in reference to the seventh day Scripture somewhere says, "And God rested from all his work on the seventh day"; and again, in the place we have referred to, God says, "They shall never enter into my rest."

Therefore, since it remains for some to enter, and those to whom it was first announced did not enter because of unbelief, God once more set a day, "today," when long afterward he spoke through David the words we have quoted:

"Today if you should hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

Now if Joshua had led them into the place of rest, God would not have spoken afterward of another day. Therefore, a sabbath rest still remains for the people of God. And he who enters into God's rest, rests from his own work as God did from his. Let us strive to enter into that rest, so that no one may fall, in imitation of the example of Israel's unbelief.

Indeed, God's word is living and effective, sharper than any two-edged sword. It penetrates and divides soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the reflections and thoughts of the heart. Nothing is concealed from him; all lies bare and exposed to the eyes of him to whom we must render an account.

Antiphon.

All For our sake Christ was obedient, accepting even death, death on a cross.

GOSPEL CANTICLE

Antiphon.

Deacon: Save us, O Savior of the world. On the cross you redeemed us by the shedding of your blood; we cry out for your help, O God.

Luke 1:68-79 The Messiah and his forerunner

| Deacon: All: | Blessed + be the Lord, the God of Israel; he has come to his people and set them free. |
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| | He has raised up for us a mighty savior, born of the house of his servant David. |
| | Through his holy prophets he promised of old that he would save us from our enemies, from the hands of all who hate us. |
| | He promised to show mercy to our fathers and to remember his holy covenant. |

| | This was the oath he swore to our father Abraham: to set us free from the hands of our enemies, free to worship him without fear, holy and righteous in his sight all the days of our life. |
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| | You, my child, shall be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his way, to give his people knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of their sins. |
| | In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace. |
| | Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen. |
| Antiphon. All: | Save us, O Savior of the world. On the cross you redeemed us by the shedding of your blood; we cry out for your help, O God. |

- Priest: Our Redeemer suffered and was buried for us in order to rise again. With sincere love we adore him, and aware of our needs we cry out:
- Deacon: Christ our Savior, your sorrowing Mother stood by you at your death and burial,
- All: in our sorrows may we share your suffering.
- Deacon: Christ our Lord, like the seed buried in the ground, you brought forth for us the harvest of grace,
- All: may we die to sin and live for God
- Deacon: Christ the Good Shepherd, in death you lay hidden from the world,
- All: teach us to love a life hidden with you in the Father.
- Deacon: Christ, the new Adam, you entered the kingdom of death to release all the just since the beginning of the world,
- All: may all who lie dead in sin hear your voice and rise to life.
- Deacon: Christ Son of the living God, through baptism we were buried with you,
- All: risen also in baptism, may we walk in newness of life.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Priest: Gathering our prayer and praises into one, let us offer the prayer Christ himself taught us: All: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

CONCLUDING PRAYER

Priest: Let us pray.

Priest: All-powerful and ever-living God, your only Son went down among the dead and rose again in glory. In your goodness raise up your faithful people, buried with him in baptism, to be one with him in the everlasting life of heaven, where he lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

All: Amen.
